#### RESOLUTION NO. 5 Series of 2024

#### APPROVING THE POLICY FOR RECOGNITION OF LAND AND CAMPUS HISTORY

**WHEREAS**, Section 31 of Republic Act Number 8371 or The Indigenous Peoples' Rights Act of 1997 states that "Recognition of Cultural Diversity - The State shall endeavor to have the dignity and diversity of the cultures, traditions, histories and aspirations of the ICCs/IPs appropriately reflected in all forms of education, public information and cultural-educational exchange".

**WHEREAS**, Mabalacat City College, as a public institution is committed to honoring the history of the land on which its campuses are situated and fostering respect to its indigenous people in the community. In line with this dedication, the college has established the Policy for Recognition of Land and Campus History.

**WHEREAS**, as part of this policy, it is mandatory for first speakers in all occasions, meetings, and classes to recite the history of the land on which MCC is situated. This includes acknowledging that the ground was once owned by the indigenous peoples, particularly the aetas.

**WHEREAS**, the campus history should also be highlighted, such as the fact that the main campus was previously the location of Dolores Elementary School before it was buried by lahar, and that the Dapdap campus was donated by the late Dr. Rubaldo Abuan.




